JULY 29: TEACHING THE HOLOCAUST

- 8:00 AM** **Check-in and Breakfast**
- 8:30 AM** **Welcome and Review Schedule**
- 9:00 AM** **Teaching the Holocaust: Tour, Activities and Resources**
Participants will go on a docent-led tour of the Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum, interact with a Survivor in our Dimension of Testimony Theater, participate in an interactive classroom program, and receive the Museum's educator resources.
- 12:30 PM** **Lunch & Keynote Speaker: Researching the Holocaust**
Join a Holocaust historian to explore what it takes to research the history of the Holocaust.
- 2:00 PM** **Echoes and Reflections: Choices Matter**
An examination of the range of choices and decisions made by individuals, communities and nations during the Holocaust is a powerful lens through which to study this history. This approach encourages deep critical thinking and analysis, and also serves as a catalyst to compel students to work toward making change in their own lives and the larger society. This learning opportunity examines the consequences of inaction and highlights the courage and difficult choices of those who rescued and resisted during the Holocaust. Educators will gain the tools to support students to implement an action-oriented project influenced by the lessons of this history.
