VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES



Visitor Guide:

Help Museum guests have the best experience possible during their visit by answering wayfinding questions and introducing galleries.



Gallery Docent:

Undergo special training to learn how to interpret the Museum's permanent exhibition for visitors.

Dimensions in TestimonySM Theater Facilitator:

Learn to facilitate sessions that allow visitors to interact with 3-D projections of Holocaust Survivors.



Docent Educator:

Give special guided tours of the entire permanent exhibition and serve as a mentor to other volunteers.

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Tier 1

Tier 1 volunteers are asked to serve 20 hours per year.

Visitor Guides are stationed throughout the Museum to greet visitors, answer wayfinding questions, and ensure our guests have the best experience possible. This is a great opportunity to explore the Museum and its permanent exhibition to prepare for the next tiers of volunteering.

Commitment: Visitor Guide volunteers are required to complete an online training and a 90-minute in-person orientation session. Visitor Guides must serve 10 hours before they are eligible to advance to the next tier.

Tier 2

Tier 2 volunteers are asked to serve 36 hours per year.

Gallery Docents choose one or more areas of focus in the permanent exhibition and undergo special training with Museum educators to learn historical content. They interpret the exhibition for visitors, answer questions, and help guide student and adult groups.

Commitment: For each area they are trained for, Gallery Docents complete 8 classroom hours and work with a Docent mentor to complete their training. Gallery Docents must complete 24 docent hours before they are eligible to apply to become a Docent Educator.

Dimensions in TestimonySM Facilitators host sessions in our Dimensions in TestimonySM Theater, which gives visitors the opportunity to interact with 3-D projections of Holocaust Survivors. Facilitators are trained on theater technology and lead Q&A sessions with visitors.

Commitment: Dimensions in TestimonySM Facilitators are required to complete a 90-minute in-person training and be observed by a staff member before they are ready to volunteer on their own.

Tier 3

Tier 3 volunteers are asked to serve 60 hours per year.

Commitment: Docent Educators train for all permanent exhibition galleries and complete an additional weeklong course.
